#### **PHJC Volunteer Program's Food Ministry Continues to Impact Lives**

Already through the month of March, the following totals have been distributed to the men, women, and children living in two local hotels in Plymouth. This only happens with incredibly dedicated volunteers who tirelessly make sandwiches, pack lunches and grocery bags, break down bulk items into individual baggies, help grocery shop, help load/unload/organize groceries for packing, stay late to clean up, open baggies for quick use, double



grocery bags for packaging, unload the bus, etc. Our PHJC kitchen coworkers have made cookies for special occasion, cooked donated chicken quarters, ravioli, and rotisserie chickens, and donated needed items. Our facilities men are so gracious to bring up frozen meals from cold storage, and bring the bus up and load it for deliveries.



Our Maria Center residents and co-workers are dedicated sandwich makers and lunch packers! Sisters from Catherine's Cottage either help with packing or help keep our grocery bags doubled for us on a regular basis. Associates and friends come out to help deliver, no matter the weather! So many others from the Motherhouse come in and lend a hand whenever they are able. It truly takes a village!

And the impact shows! We continue to feed 65 individuals, couples and families every Tuesday and Thursday. Residents are showing an increase in obtaining jobs. Children are receiving the shoes, coats, and other necessities. Babies are getting diapers, formula, wet wipes, etc. A homeless woman was able to get help storing her belongings while temporarily living with our Sisters in Catherine's Cottage. Some are finding affordable apartments and moving into Serenity Place in Plymouth! God is good and HOPE abides!

Other assistance give includes help with job applications, trips to the eye doctor and physician, children's shoes and coats, rent, cooking utensils, raincoat for worker who walks to work, knee brace, phone card minutes for amputee to stay connected with her doctor, work clothes for someone obtaining a new job, a cot and bedding for young boy sleeping on motel floor, epilepsy medication, etc.

We thank God for generous persons and the Poor handmaids of Jesus Christ who help make all this possible through donations and a grant. Thank you to all 47 volunteers these three months for "fostering gospel values and (building) communities in communion." (PHJC Vision Statement 2021)

- Passed out flyers for the Marshall Country Health Department/United Way for COVID-19
  vaccine clinics and Tobacco Cessation
- ✓ Passed out flyers for the Plymouth School System for Head Start (free Pre-School/Transportation)
- Passed out flyers for Link to Hope, a faith-based organization in Plymouth that offers temporary rental, utility, and prescription assistance as well as transportation to and from shelters.
- ✓ As a goal of the Marshall Country Food Council and in addressing food insecurity, we developed and passed out flyers for local food pantries. Working with farmers to share leftover produce.
- ✓ Obtained permission and placed a bulletin board in the lobby of one of the motels for display of information and educational materials.
- ✓ In collaboration with St. Joseph Health System, passed out 23 of theirs and 27 of the PHJC Volunteer Program's crock pots and safety tip sheets to provide another means of cooking besides small microwaves The PHJCVP provided cooking utensils for all 50 residents.
- ✓ Developed and passed out flyers with information on accessing transportation through the Council on Aging.
- ✓ Passed out flyers with important **emergency phone numbers**.
- ✓ Passed out flyers listing 10 shelters in St. Joseph, Elkhart, Kosciusko, LaPorte, and Whitley Counties as well as Ft. Wayne.
- ✓ Working with LIFT (Lending Inspirational Friendship Together) to teach life skills, share resources, mentor, and support women who need a "lift."
- Passed out flyers with information on places for food assistance and free meals in Plymouth, Bremen, Knox, Grovertown and Argos with meals.
- Surveyed persons at motels for diabetes and passed out glucose monitoring strips to four residents who could not afford them. Informed them of Link to Hope for assistance with medications.
- Passed out information on Marshall County/Trustee
  Contacts for rent, gas, and energy assistance.
